What is an army without soldiers? It's a bunch of guns on the ground. A *soldier* is the man or woman who fights for their government and carries the weapons, risking their life in the process. The word comes from the Latin *solidus*, which is the name of the gold coin used to pay soldiers who fought in the Roman army. To "soldier on" to persist steadfastly in one's work; persevere: to soldier on until the work is done.

KI BOIS Community Action is honored to have many *SOLDIERS* among us. They know what it means to give to their Country and to fight for the freedoms we all hold near.

Aubrey Jones was born in Tacoma, Washington, he graduated from Eufaula High School and entered the U.S Army in 1977 at the age of 17 and six months. Jones served his country until 1986 and ended his service with the rank of E-5. According to Jones, "It made me proud and honored to be able to serve."

Jones served at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Fort Hood, Texas and served a total of three years in Germany

Gregory Wherland served in the U.S. Marine Corp from 1974 to 1993. Wherland was born in Cleveland, Ohio and was 17 years old when he enlisted. He served in the Vietnam Era and was part of *Operation Baby Lift*. He re-enlisted six (6) times. He served two (2) tours in Japan and retired as an E-6. In 1983 Wherland was assigned to Escort Duty so he could escort his brothers' casket from Dover, Delaware to Dresel, MO. "Although I faced some difficult times, joining the Marines was the best thing that ever happened to me, it saved my life!" according to Wherland.

I want to brag on my driver, Gary Withrow. On Wednesday November 4th, Gary

went and picked up our dialysis client Edward Neff. He lives here in Poteau and to dialysis it is about a 7 minute drive. He loaded up Mr. Neff as usual and when he arrived at dialysis. As he went to deploy the lift he noticed Mr. Neff was slumped over in his chair and unresponsive. He tried a couple of times to get him to respond. He called me immediately when he was unable to get him to response and I told him go get help from the dialysis workers and I'll call 911. He went inside and got the workers and they immediately began CPR. EMS arrived within a few minutes and took over care. Had Gary not noticed there was medical emergency and took immediately action Mr. Neff would not be alive today. Mr. Neff is in Baptist Hospital with a diagnosis of a massive heart attack.

Sir Charles Spencer Chaplin KBE (16 April 1889 – 25 December 1977) was an English comic actor, filmmaker, and composer who rose to fame in the era of silent film. Chaplin's childhood in London was one of poverty and hardship, as his father was absent and his mother struggled financially, and he was sent to a workhouse twice before the age of nine. When he was 14, his mother was committed to a mental asylum. Chaplin began performing at an early age, touring music halls and later working as a stage actor and comedian. At 19, he was signed to the prestigious Fred Karno company, which took him to America. He was scouted for the film industry and began appearing in 1914 for Keystone Studios. He soon developed the Tramp persona and formed a large fan base. He directed his own films and continued to hone his craft. By 1918, he was one of the best-known figures in the world. Charlie Chaplin lived 88 years and left us with these thoughts:

Nothing is forever in this world, even our problems. I love to walk in the rain because no one can see my tears. The most lost day in life is the day we don't laugh. Six of the best doctors in the world: Sun, Rest, Exercise, Diet, Self respect and friends If you see the moon, you will see the beauty of God.... If you see the sun, you will see the power of God.... If you see a mirror, you will see Gods best creation. So believe it. We are all tourists, God is our travel agent.....

Life is just a journey! So live today! Tomorrow may not be.


