

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

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Is Coming To Haskell County

The opportunity to work with the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has become a reality for the Haskell County Coalition. Through a collaboration with the Oklahoma Department of Education and local fundraising efforts, this program will launch this summer to children in Haskell County.

The Program is already offered in LeFlore, Pittsburg, Muskogee and Latimer Counties, and the groundwork has been established to offer it in Sequoyah County. The addition of Haskell County will mean that children in the six-county KI BOIS service area, aged 0-5 years, will be provided a book a month for free. KI BOIS Community Action serves as the fiscal agent for the Haskell County Coalition on this project.

Imagination Library is Dolly Parton's organization established in 1995 that brings reading right to the mailbox of the child registered. "We are currently fundraising for years one and two, which is approximately \$5,000.00. When this goal is reached, we will open registration," said Royce Alverson, Chair of the Haskell County Coalition. "The Oklahoma Department of Education covers half the cost of each book and our organization is responsible for the other half. The benefits will be unmeasurable. Each book is high quality and age appropriate," Alverson said.

Marketing, fundraising and enrollment committees have been established and meetings are being held to put in place the final pieces to start accepting registrations. So stay tuned to KI BOIS NEWS and social media for announcements.





Kennedy and members of the National Council of Senior Citizens led to designating May as 'Senior Citizens Month,' the prelude to 'Older Americans Month.'

"Historically, Older Americans Month has been a time to acknowledge the contributions of past and current older persons to our country, in particular those who defended our country. Every President since Kennedy has issued a formal proclamation during or before the month of May asking that the entire nation pay tribute in some way to older persons in their communities. Older Americans Month is celebrated across the country through ceremonies, events, fairs, and other such activities."
